Dear Friends,

October, as we all know, is the month of the Holy Rosary and is known as such because of a specific event which took place on October 7th 1571. It is known as the naval battle of Lepanto fought between the combined navies of Western Europe and the Ottoman Empire. Centuries before this battle had seen the armies of the Ottoman Turks winning major land victories in their quest to invade Western Europe. The most stunning of these had been the Turkish capture of the city of Constantinople in 1453 which opened the way for the invasion of Western Europe. The Turks renamed the city of Constantinople and to this day it is known as Istanbul. In addition to victories on land, the Turks began to seek naval victories to take control of the Mediterranean Sea. In the year 1571 both navies were headed for a major battle south of Greece. In early October the two fleets were approaching each other and On October 7th joined in the Battle of Lepanto. At first the wind gave the advantage to the Turks but in the course of the battle the wind shifted giving the advantage to the Western fleet which gained a complete victory over the Turks and destroyed Turkish sea power. The victory, while complete, did not eliminate the threat from the Turks who would continue the battle on land for another century until their ultimate defeat at the battle of Vienna in 1683. Pope Pius V had asked all of Europe to pray the rosary in hopes of a victory. Because of this, the victory was attributed to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and because of this Pope Pius established the feast of Our Lady of Victory on April 30 the following year. The feast was later transferred to October 7<sup>th</sup>, the anniversary of the battle, and renamed Our Lady of the Rosary. It is the patronal feast of our sister parish down the hill. Our Lady of Victory.

On Saturday, October 4<sup>th</sup>, we will celebrate the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. We will, therefore, have our annual blessing of the pets on Friday, October 3<sup>rd</sup>. We will gather that day at Noon at the statue of St. Francis on the side of the chapel. All pets are invited and as always they are welcome to bring their human partners along. As always, proper behavior is expected and pets are warned that if any human misbehaves, security will be notified and appropriate action will be taken
